**White Wines
House Selection**

Domaine de Bertier 2008 France £16.95
Domaine de Bertier is a single estate located near Montpellier in Southern France. The white is a blend of Viognier and Sauvignon Blanc, fresh and quite peachy in flavour.

Cortello Branco, Estremadura 2008 Portugal £17.95
Down in the south of Portugal in the Estremadura region, the country's indigenous grape varieties Arinto and Fernao Pires cope with the heat to produce intriguing yet satisfying dry white wines. The flavours are subtly exotic and there is a piquant undertone, making it a good partner to fish and shellfish and notably, spicy food.

Rioja Vega, Viña Cerrada Blanco 2008 Spain £18.95
100% Viura grapes are used in this classic white Rioja. With low acidity, high fruit and a clean finish this wine is good for cocktails or drinking on its own.

White Wines

Amapola 2008 Chile £19.50
85 % Sauvignon Blanc, 15% Chardonnay. This cleverly versatile wine combines the fruity bold scents of the New World with a rewardingly full yet subtle depth of flavour. Although principally from Sauvignon Blanc, there is a tiny seasoning of Chardonnay to give breadth and substance so the wine is equally at home lightly chilled with snacks or with salads and cold meats.

Porta Italica 2008 Italy £19.50
100% Pinot Grigio. Cool fermented with lees contact to give extra complexity to this fresh wine.

Santa Celina 2008 Argentina £20.00
100% Pinot Gris from Mendoza, situated on a plateau in the foothills of the Andes and ranging in altitude from around 450 metres to 1200 metres above sea level. Pinot Gris grapes are grown at the higher altitudes as the temperature is cooler, consequently lengthening the ripening process.

MandraRossa 2008 Italy £20.00
100% Fiano. The MandraRossa range is designed for early drinking but retaining complexity and interest at the same time. The palate is inviting, exotic and generous, displaying aromatic tropical fruits and hints of minerals. Excellent as an aperitif and will complement oily fish and full flavoured white meats.

Domaine de la Cessane 2006 France £20.50
Marsanne/ Viognier. Vin de Pays d'Oc. Two of Rhône's principle grape varieties that work perfectly in tandem. Ideal for accompanying light fish or meat without a rich sauce.

Domaine Langlois-Château, Saumer Blanc 2008 France £21.50
100% Chenin Blanc. A lifted fresh and approachable, fruity Saumur which offers the freshness of its chalky soil with the honeyed characters of the grape variety.

Chapoutier, Côtes-du-Rhône, Belleruche Blanc 2007 France £22.00
The 2007 Côtes du Rhône Belleruche blanc is a blend of Grenache Blanc, Boursoulenc, and Marsanne and shows honeysuckle, lemon oil, and white currants in a medium-bodied, crisp, attractive, surprisingly serious style. Biodynamically produced.

My Word Is My Bond, Peter Lehmann 2007 Australia £22.00
100% Riesling. 'My Word Is My Bond' is the principle that led to the foundation of Peter Lehmann Wines in the Barossa in 1980, when Peter Lehmann started his own winery to do the 'right thing' and protect his mates. This wine is very delicate with green tints in colour with spicy fruit and delicate floral aromas.

Escale	2006	France	£22.75
<i>100% Sauvignon Blanc. This is our top Sauvignon offering from the quality white wine region of Gascony. It is intensely fresh and aromatic with classic notes of gooseberries and cut grass. At only half the price of a bottle of Sancerre, this is a real bargain!</i>			
Pulenta Estate	2008	Argentina	£23.50
<i>100% Chardonnay. Pulenta get better with each year. The whites were initially rather too 'made'; now they have better balance and more poise. In their 2006 Chardonnay, the aroma has a delicate balance between the tropical and the creamy, with hints of fruits from the citric end of the spectrum to add definition. A versatile wine perfect with freshwater fish or white meats.</i>			
Wickham Vineyards	2008	England	£24.50
<i>Fabar. Is it me or does drinking this wine give a rush equal to that of twisting a Russet from the tree?! I'm not picking up any accent but I know that the majority of the fruit is estate grown, just down the road, as well as a parcel of fruit 'all the way' from the New Forest. Chalky, floral, newly-mown grass and slightly tropical aromas characterise this otherwise cool, classic Hampshire white, eerily reminiscent of Marlborough Sauvignon Blanc.</i>			
Gavi di Gavi	2007	Italy	£25.00
<i>Cru la Maddelena, Roberto Sarotto. 100% Cortese grapes from the southern Piedmontese hills. An excellent aperitif wine, un-oaked and with flavours of white stone fruit.</i>			
Speigal Heidler	2007	Austria	£27.00
<i>100% Grüner Veltliner. This Spiegel vineyard Grüner delivers a full, peppery palate and faintly apricot-scented wine that at 13% alcohol will cope with most summery white meat and fish.</i>			
Domaine de Gerbeaux, Macon-Solotr�	2006	France	£27.50
<i>100% Chardonnay. A delicious M�acon cuv�e reserved entirely for Berry Bros. & Rudd. This has delightful, attractive soft fresh fruit with a mineral touch for drinking early.</i>			
Ostler, Marlborough	2008	New Zealand	£28.00
<i>100% Sauvignon Blanc. Pretty, finely detailed, spring nettle aromatics; the palate's dry, quite sophisticated in fact with refined creamy, lime and gooseberry flavours; a definite step up from run-of-the-mill Marlborough wine, thanks, no doubt, to its single Waihopai Valley vineyard source.</i>			
Lagar de Cervera	2006	Spain	£29.00
<i>100% Albari�o, Rias Baixas. Medium bodied, dry wine from the high-trained vines of the greener Western tip of Spain, the frighteningly modish Albari�o grape. Aromatic, broadly textured and gently spicy, the Lagar is a famous example. To try with the fruits of the Atlantic.</i>			
Domaine Dirl�er-Cad�	2005	France	£32.00
<i>100% Riesling. Assertive herb-tinged nose with green fruit characters. Quite full, herby palate is savoury and dry. Biodynamically produced.</i>			
Domaine de Fourchaume, Chablis Premier Cru	2007	France	£38.00
<i>100% Chardonnay. A 17 hectare holding and one of the best placed premier crus in terms of soil, drainage and exposure. Again no cask ageing and more complex and youthful than the village Chablis.</i>			
Ch�teau de Puligny-Montrachet	2005	France	£39.50
<i>100% Chardonnay. Clos du Ch�teau. Ch�teau de Puligny was a slumbering force until finally been awoken by the arrival of Etienne de Montille in time to oversee the 2001 vintage. Under Etienne, yields have been drastically reduced and the wines are handled much more sympathetically in the cellar so that the quality of the fruit dominates the oak.</i>			

Rosé Wines

Château Gassier 2006 France £23.00
40% Syrah, 30% Grenache, 30% Cinsault. Selected from vineyards surrounding the most traditional of all rosé growing areas, Aix en Provence. Deliciously fruity, soft and very easy to drink, finishing crisp and refreshing.

Domaine Les Aphyllanthes 2007 France £24.00
Côtes du Rhône Rosé. The domaine is located in the small town of Travaillan, just northwest of Gigondas. Here Daniel and Hélène have been fashioning Côtes du Rhône using biodynamic principals. Their red wine is also listed.

Red Wines House Selection

Berry's House Red 2007 France £16.95
Merlot blend. The philosophy behind Berrys' Own Selection wines is simple. "We seek to work with leading producers to handcraft wines that are truly representative of both the wines region of origin and the winemaker's individual winemaking style. These are the wines on which our reputation rests, so you can be sure that we have left no stone unturned in unearthing the best value and quality possible in each region".

Amapola 2008 Chile £17.95
100% Cabernet Sauvignon. Deep red fruits reminiscent of blackcurrants and spice on the nose from the rolling vineyards of the Maipo Valley. Smooth and rewarding on the palate that is light enough for a glass as an aperitif as well as accompanying both red and white meats. True value for money from S. America.

Rioja Vega, Viña Cerrada Tinto 2006 Spain £18.95
50% Tempranillo, 40% Grenache and 10% Mazuelo make this a bright garnet red wine with purple hues. Un-oaked and with notes of red berries; a good wine for drinking without food.

Red Wines

Le Petit Chapoton, Vin de Pays 2006 France £19.50
This is a most superior offering for a French Vin de Pays. Fashioned from arid and rocky vineyards in the southern Rhône by Serge Remusan, this is both succulent and fruity, but underpinned by notes of thyme and rosemary. With hearty fare is where the wine shines best; charcuterie, terrines, provençale flavours and anything in a casserole.

Ashbury Grove 2006 Australia £19.70
Cabernet Sauvignon / Shiraz. The Shiraz was harvested from selected vineyards in mid March at optimal fruit ripeness while the Cabernet Sauvignon was harvested in late March to early April to allow rich ripe fruit characters to develop. The parcels of grapes were kept separate throughout fermentation before being blended and oak matured. The aim was for a seamless integration of the Cabernet fruit structure and flavour intensity with the richness and warmth of Shiraz.

MandraRossa 2008 Italy £20.00
100% Nero d'Avola. This wine shows the true potential in Sicilian red wine. Richly textured with layers of damson, plum and liquorice spice flavours, elegant but powerful.

Domaine de la Cessane 2005 France £20.50
Grenache and Merlot work well together here. Vinified separately, when assembled they yield a wine with ripe black fruit, spicyness and good length.

Man Vintners	2006	South Africa	£21.50
<i>Pinotage, with a dash of Shiraz and Viognier. Deep ruby red in the glass with a beguiling nose of strawberries and black cherries and a subtle hint of Pinotage's trademark smoky complexity. Juicy and fresh on the palate, this wine is extremely moreish.</i>			
La Flor, Pulenta, Mendoza	2006	Argentina	£22.00
<i>100% Malbec. Deep purple in colour with a nose of red berries, vanilla and chocolate, the wine is blessed with beautiful sweet fruit and a delicious and spicy backdrop. Rich and elegant, but with an almost ethereal quality, but sufficiently grounded to accompany a sirloin steak!</i>			
Escale	2006	France	£23.00
<i>100% Pinot Noir. The very lightly oaked Escale Pinot Noir is elegant and fruity, displaying all the hallmarks of the Pinot grape with hints of raspberries on the nose and silky tannin structure on the palate.</i>			
Berrys' Chianti Classico	2007	Italy	£24.00
<i>The Classico region tends to produce fuller, meatier styles of Chianti, and this is a prime example. Extra body is provided by the addition of Cabernet Sauvignon to the Sangiovese. The palate shows plenty of warm fleshy bitter cherry fruit amid a broad structure, softened through 2-3 years of large old barrel & bottle ageing.</i>			
Domaine Alain Chatoux, Beaujolais	2007	France	£24.50
<i>100% Gamay. Villes Vignes. Another very fine effort from the big man, this displays lively raspberry fruit flavours, a pleasing spicy backdrop and a velvety finish. Try very lightly chilled, al fresco, with a summer salad or oysters.</i>			
Wrattonbully, Smith and Hooper	2005	Australia	£25.00
<i>Cabernet Sauvignon / Merlot. The wine is sourced entirely from two premium, adjacent vineyard blocks in Wrattonbully, previously owned by the Smith and Hooper families. Wrattonbully is blessed with some of the most celebrated winegrowing soil Australia - Terra Rossa, aka 'red earth', a rich, free-draining soil. The 2004 Cab Sauvignon-Merlot offers intense aromas of violets and black currants, with vanilla overtones. The palate is rich with a velvety texture.</i>			
Ondarre, Rioja Reserva	2004	Spain	£26.00
<i>Tempranillo 75%, Garnacha 10%, Mazuelo 15%. Intense cherry red colour. Aromas of oak ageing with hints of spices. Strong attack, good backbone, full-flavoured, with well integrated long-lasting tannins. Long and persistent finish.</i>			
Eco Trail	2004	Canada	£26.50
<i>60% Cabernet Franc, 30% Chambourcin, 10% Zweigelt. A great wine to be enjoyed with friends around the dinner table. Pelee Island is home to the rarest natural habitat in Ontario. While the island is well known by wine experts, dedicated bird watchers and tourists also come to enjoy the island's natural beauty and simplicity.</i>			
Domaine Les Aphillanthes, Côtes du Rhône	2005	France	£26.50
<i>100% Syrah. The domaine is located in the small town of Travaillan, just northwest of Gigondas. Here Daniel and Helene have been fashioning Côtes du Rhône which have burst onto the international markets to considerable acclaim, with an effusive Parker describing the wines as "spectacularly powerful, concentrated...comparable to the finest Gigondas and Chateauneuf du Papes". Biodynamically produced.</i>			
Peachy Canyon	2006	USA	£27.00
<i>100% Zinfandel 'Incredible Red' from this 18 Hectare vineyard in the Paso Robles area nestled in Santa Lucia Mountains. The winery exemplifies the contrasts of a region which is ideally suited to growing Zinfandel. This wine is dominated by strawberry and raspberry aromas with a hint of black pepper - beautifully balanced.</i>			
Crozes Hermitage	2004	France	£29.00
<i>Les Meysonniers, 100% Syrah. A perennial favourite; famously and incomprehensibly described by the grower Michel Chapoutier as 'more disco than baroque', a celebration at its most accessible and friendly, with plums, pepper and bright fruit to the fore. Biodynamically produced.</i>			

Ara, Composite Vineyards	2007	New Zealand	£30.00
<i>100% Pinot Noir. Composite wines are from Ara, a new origin of wine that lies at the confluence of the Wairau and Waihopai rivers in the world famous Marlborough region of New Zealand. Ara is an extensive and ancient river terrace – a remarkable feature on the New Zealand landscape presenting superb conditions for growing exceptional cool-climate Sauvignon Blanc and Pinot Noir. The wines, name and label designs are an integrated expression of the place -Ara -from soil classification, vineyard design, trellis construction and water networks to small batch winemaking and careful blending.</i>			
Saint Emilion Grand Cru	2005	France	£31.50
<i>Château Reine Blanche. Beautifully polished plum and raspberry jump out on the nose, with serious density of fruit and a sumptuous chocolate edge. A luscious palate, with a gorgeous sweet juiciness to the tannin. Layers of blackberry fruit are guided to the back of the palate by a crisp, racy tannin. A cracker to drink now and over the next 2-3 years.</i>			
Waterford	2004	South Africa	£32.00
<i>100% Cabernet Sauvignon. The best vintage in Stellenbosch in the last 10-15 years. The Helderberg aromas tend to be a little earthy as opposed to fruity during the early stages of maturing in the bottle, and given sufficient time in the glass they expand considerably.</i>			
Chorey-Lès-Beaune	2005	France	£34.00
<i>Piece Chapitre, Domaine Tollot-Beaut, 100% Pinot Noir. The Tollot-Beaut family domaine is based at Chorey-Les-Beaune, often thought of as a slightly old-fashioned backwater. Their vineyard holdings, however, extend to Beaune, Savigny, Aloxe-Corton and a tiny holding in the Corton Charlemagne vineyard. The hallmark of their wines is a striking purity of fruit -the reds display a truly succulent quality supported (but never dominated) by judicious use of oak.</i>			
Château Batailley	2004	France	£36.75
<i>Château Batailley 5ieme Cru Paulliac has cassis, tobacco and vanilla-charged elements, with a subtle yet firm Paulliac backbone. An exceedingly approachable claret.</i>			
Gevrey Chambertin	2005	France	£44.00
<i>Camille Giroud, 100% Pinot Noir. This dry light-bodied red wine is a classic example of a red burgundy. The quality of winemaking is consistent and very much in the modern, quality-oriented genre, although the practice of very gentle oak treatment and little racking (decanting is advised for young wines) continues, so that each cuvée has a very individual character.</i>			

Dessert Wines

Elysium	2007	USA	£22.00
<i>Black Muscat (37.5cl). Andy Quady created the Elysium wine to have an aroma of roses and berry-like tastes. It is rich and full flavoured and matches a variety of desserts and blue cheeses, and particularly chocolate.</i>			
Castelnau de Suduiraut	2004/2005	France	£25.50
<i>Sauternes, 2nd wine of Château Suduiraut (37.5cl). Wonderful sweetness but never cloying. Exotic apricots and almonds in perfect balance. Brilliant with creamy desserts, blue cheese and foie gras.</i>			
Allenmere	2004	Australia	£27.00
<i>Botrytis Semillon (37.5cl). From Australia's most notorious wine region, sweet wine delights can also be found! The Semillon grape in Australia gives the wine a rich and unctuous texture. The flavours are complex, showing orange marmalade and honeysuckle.</i>			

Vintage Port

Wines of this quality are made using the traditional treading techniques that have not changed in 2000 years, producing wines with intense colour and flavour. Selected from a number of top quality vineyards, including Warres own Quinta da Cavadinha, the company's Vintage Port is aged in wooden cask for 18 months before being bottled unfiltered using a normal driven cork.

Warre's Vintage	1991		£52.30
<i>Given a 90 out of 100 by Robert Parker; this may prove to be a classic vintage. Drinks well now and will improve over the next few years.</i>			
Warre's Vintage	1985		£65.30
<i>Tremendous backbone with a rich complexity of balanced fruit showing through. This elegant Port has the characteristic Warre's flowery nose and its solidity shows it to be a lasting Vintage. Perfect for drinking now.</i>			

Champagnes

- Moutard Père & Fils, Cuvée Prestige £40.00
The Moutard family have been making Champagne for almost three centuries. Here, Chardonnay and Pinot Noir are harmoniously blended in equal parts to create this exquisite wine. An elegant nose combining floral and fruity notes, it shows a supple and full-bodied palate with a long, lingering finish.
- Ayala, Château de Ay £46.50
Brut Majeur is the result of the blending of a particular harvest with quality reserve wines. Ay being the capital of Pinot Noir, this noble grape is always dominant thus ensuring the vinosity, the fullness and the intensity of the wine. Chardonnay gives elegance, liveliness and finesse, and Pinot Meunier adds a delicate fresh and fruity note.
- Ayala Blanc de blanc, Château de Ay £49.50
This vintage 100% Chardonnay champagne is a blend of three Grand Crus from the Côtes des Blancs in which Le Mesnil has the largest proportion, completed with wines from Cramant and Chouilly. These Crus combine beautifully to deliver a very elegant, light, creamy and lively wine.
- Ayala Rose, Château de Ay £49.50
Rose Majeur is a unique blend where the importance is given to Chardonnay which accounts for more than 40% of the cuvée. The unusual proportion of white grapes and low dosage gives extra-ordinary delicacy to the wine.
- Bollinger Special Cuvée NV £55.00
Bollinger contains a high percentage of Pinot Noir in the blend making it one of the richest non-vintage Champagnes.
- Billecart Salmon Brut Réserve Rosé NV £80.00
Owned by the original family established in 1818 by Nicolas-François Billecart. Most of Billecart-Salmon's fruit comes from a small vineyard holding. Meticulous production techniques, from the use of their own cultured yeast to its long, slow, cool fermentation, ensure that the family has 100% control of production.
- Veuve Clicquot, La Grande Dame 1998 Price dependent on market value
Six years on lees, the 1996 Grande Dame is 'grande' indeed and much sought after. Traditionally voluptuous, the style is perfectly suited to the vintage. The blend is 65/35 in favour of Pinot Noir, the grapes being sourced from only the very best sites.
- Louis Roederer Cristal 1993 Price dependent on market value
The jewel of the House of Louis Roederer is Cristal, created in 1876 for Tsar Alexander II. Cristal is made according to the strictest criteria, based on a drastic process of selection applying to the vintage, the cru, the village, the grapes and finally the wines. Only Pinot Noir and Chardonnay grapes from the House's 10 most celebrated crus are used in the production of this legendary cuvée.

Sparkling Wines

Ondarre, Brut Cava Spain £19.50
Bodegas Ondarre, whose winery is in Viana, 6 kls from Logroño, Rioja's capital, has all the advantages of a bodega which was conceived and designed with a new philosophy. A blend of Macabeo, Xarello and Parellada grapes aged for a minimum of 30 months.

Prosecco di Conegliano DOC Extra Dry Italy £20.50
Produced by Carpenè Malvolti in Veneto. Founded in 1868 by the famed oenologist Antonio Carpenè Malvolti, the company has been a noteworthy contributor to the history and study of Prosecco and is now run by the fourth generation of great sparkling wine makers. Grapes for the Prosecco di Conegliano are selected only from the hillside vineyards in the DOC area.

Cremant de Loire Brut France £24.00
Vibrant and racy fruit, bready yeast flavours and zesty apple freshness is accompanied by the waxed-lemon flavours of Chenin Blanc - a variety so clearly suited for sparkling production due to its fine acidity. The fifth of Chardonnay adds fruitiness and depth.

Bird in the Hand Australia £26.00
100% Pinot Noir. Estate grown and hand-picked. Salmon pink colour with a delicate strawberry aroma. The palate shows complexity with cherry and strawberry flavours and a creamy texture. The refined structure is highlighted by its subtle acidity and the elegance of very fine beading.
